## **MOLDOVA**

Mihai Grecu (22 November 1916 – 9 April 1998) is one of the most famous painters in Moldova, and co-founder of the National School of Painting.

He is also known for his poems and his gifted personality.

Grecu had revolutionized the plastic arts in Moldova; in 1991 he had won the "Grand Prize of the Ministry of Culture from Romania" for the painting "Homage to ancestors".

Each county has its own musical instrument which characterizes its tradition. The traditional music of Russia is represented by #balalaika, which belongs in the family of lute.

Balalaika was developed in the  $18^{\rm th}$  century from the dombra, or domra, a round-bodied, long-necked, three-stringed lute.
