## ML in the Black Sea (1)



- Bucharest Convention is a Regional Sea Convention for the Black Sea basin; signed in Bucharest in 1992 and ratified in 1994; its basic objective is to prevent, reduce and control the pollution in the Black Sea providing the legal framework for co-operation in this regard;
- 4 thematic Protocols: LBS Protocol; Dumping Protocol; Emergency Situations Protocol; CBD Protocol;
- LBS Protocol in force, *inter alia*, sets the obligations to control, monitor and assess pollution from land-based sources, including the riverine loads;
- Very important document is Strategic Action Plan (SAP) on the Protection and Rehabilitation of the Black Sea – adopted in 1996 and amended in 2009 in Sofia;
- 2 out of 6 countries are members to the EU, therefore, EU environmental legislation is not legally binding;
- There is no specific Advisory Group on Marine Litter, but due to the crosscutting nature of marine litter, all the rest are dealing to some extent with the ML problematics.

#### ML in the Black Sea (2)



- No concrete legal instruments dedicated specifically to the management of ML till October, 2018 (!!!);
- Bucharest Convention and its Protocols contain several Articles relevant to ML;
- The Annexes to LBS Protocol (in force), Dumping Protocol contain three lists of hazardous substances and matter which include those materials which constitute plastic ML;
- The new LBS Protocol agreed upon in 2009, but which has not yet entered into force, includes a clear definition of marine litter (borrowed from UNEP);
- The latest version of BS SAP (2009) incorporated the recommendations on fighting with marine litter, and presented a series of management targets –
  Report on implementation of BS SAP 2009 is being drafted;

# Marine Litter in the Black Sea (3)



- In 2005, the Regional Activity on Marine Litter, supported by UNEP, was launched;
- During the following 3 years the two relevant Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) between the BSC Permanent Secretariat and UNEP (Nairobi) were implemented ;
- 2007 Report on Marine Litter in the Black Sea (incl. the text of the Draft Marine Litter Action Plan for the Black Sea);
- Recommendation for updating the BS SAP, on methodologies, monitoring and assessment, increased public awareness on marine litter in the Black Sea;
- Partner or sub-contractor in a range of EU-funded projects (Advisory Board of MARLISCO, CLEANSEA, MSFD Project, PERSEUS, STAGES etc.), Berlin Conference on Marine Litter;
- In 2015 BSC joined the UNEP Partnership on Marine Litter!!!

#### Marine Litter in the Black Sea (4)



- **During its 31<sup>st</sup> BSC Regular Meeting (7-8<sup>th</sup> October, 2015):**
- The Commission welcomed the cooperation with UNEP and, in particular, implementation of marine litter related activities under the BSC PS - UNEP MoU.
- The Commission took note of the proposal of Bulgaria on the draft Regional Action Plan on Marine Litter Management in the Black Sea and to asked ESAS/LBS/PMA AGs to consider it and to follow the issue.
- The Commission agreed that further activities on the Regional Action Plan on Marine Litter Management in the Black Sea will be included in the BSC Work Programme for 2015/2016.

## Marine Litter in the Black Sea (5)



- In the adopted BSIMAP 2017-2022 (October, 2016) marine litter is only mentioned in the text, therefore, neccessary annexes should be added to reflect it;
- Since December, 2016, we implement SSFA with UNEP/MAP with a number of activities under Marine Litter MED project to strengthen bilateral collaboration aimed to: 1) finalize the draft Regional Action Plan on Marine Litter Management in the Black Sea; 2) elaborate, further develop and finalize the Marine Litter Monitoring Programme for the Black Sea; 3) draft a joint work plan between UNEP/MAP and the BSC PS; 4) organize annual joint meeting between both Secretariats.

#### Marine Litter in the Black Sea (6)



- Since December, 2016, BSC PS implements the Agreement with UNEP/MAP implementing a number of activities under Marine Litter MED project, both documents were drafted under this Agreement and 2 bilateral meetings were held:
- Round table discussion on Marine Litter MED project at UNEP/MAP premises in Athens on <u>24<sup>th</sup> July, 2017</u>: progress was reported, follow-up on the establishment of the bilateral cooperation between UNEP/MAP and BSC PS was discussed, detailed Joint work plan of activities among UNEP/MAP and BSC PS was drafted to be implemented in the following three (3) years;
- The 2nd Bilateral Coordination Meeting between UNEP/MAP and BSC PS was held on <u>6th December, 2018</u> in Istanbul. Turkey, to discuss recent developments and priorities, as well as to set the way forward in implementation of Joint Implementation Plan and MoU, as well to produce the Joint Workplan for 2019; During the meeting the participants produced the recommendations in the table format regarding the future work to be done and emphasized the necessity to carry out the next 3rd Bilateral Coordination Meeting in the first half of 2019.

# Marine Litter in the Black Sea (7):



- At 34th BSC Regular Meeting (25-26th October, 2018) the Regional Action Plan on ML in the Black Sea was adopted by BSC (!!!) and tasked to further elaborate on ML Monitoring Guidelines. They will be further revised against concrete actions, taking into account experience of other Regional Sea Conventions (RSCs) and relevant projects and organizations;
- **Expert Meeting** on finalization of BS ML Monitoring Guidelines and implementation of BS SAP on ML planned for summer, 2019.

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## Marine Litter in the Black Sea (9):



Plastics is not yet addressed in the legally binding documents of the BSC, but efforts to coordinate the plastic strategy and implementation of UNEA-3 resolution on plastic litter and microplastics pollution are made through abovementioned activities under SSFA with UNEP/MAP (i.e. BS Regional Action Plan for ML and BS ML Monitoring Guidelines).

#### ML in the Black Sea (10):



- Some relevant measures and activities to prevent and reduce marine litter from fisheries and aquaculture and related impacts on marine ecosystems in BS RAP on ML:
- Implement "Gear marking to indicate ownership" concept and 'reduced ghost catches through the use of environmental neutral upon degradation of nets, pots and traps concept', in consultation with the competent international and regional organizations in the fishing sector;
- Organise training courses on ghost fishing;
- Implementation of the "Fishing for Litter" environmentally sound practices, in consultation with the competent international and regional organizations, to facilitate clean up of the floating litter and the seabed from marine litter caught incidentally and/or generated by fishing vessels in their regular activities including derelict fishing gears.

#### ML in the Black Sea (11):



 Implementation of the Agreement on the Conservation of Cetaceans of the Black Sea, Mediterranean Sea and contiguous Atlantic area (ACCOBAMS), where applicable.

#### **Conclusions/recommendations:**



- To coordinate the mechanism of implementation of ML RAP for Black Sea with relevant regional partners (BSEC, PABSEC, industries, academia, NGOs etc.);
- To harmonize approaches with 4 European RSCs ML RAPs, as well as relevant fisheries organizations and initiatives on regional and global level (UN activities, FAO (GFCM), CBD Convention, Regular process on Global Reporting (World Ocean Assessment II); Global Working Group on Indicators; EU MSFD, SOI Initiative, Ocean Governance, SDGs, Aichi Targets etc.);
- To harmonize the approaches on establishing the baselines for ML and monitoring techniques on regional and global level ;
- To encourage appropriate involvement of various authorities and other stakeholders (Regional, National and local authorities from Eisheries and Aquaculture sector, Non-governmental organizations NGOS and Civil society.
